WHAT IS ANR?

Agriculture and Natural Resources (ANR) is a program area of the Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service. Extension ANR programs are part of the outreach program of the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

We provide informal education in agricultural production and environmental stewardship. Departmental specialists, researchers, and county agents develop and implement ANR programs. In addition to production agriculture, a small staff of Extension Associates work with county agents to provide focused assistance. These programs may comingle between production agriculture and environmental stewardship. Our programs make a difference in the lives of millions of Kentuckians through research-based education. Working with our other land grant partner, Kentucky State University, we extend the resources of the University to the people in their local communities. County agents serve as the link between people in every Kentucky county and experts at the universities. They coordinate and provide educational programs for the public through meetings and workshops, field days, personal communications, and web or satellite broadcasts. Agents also provide publications, newsletters, computer programs, videos, and other educational materials.

Grayson County AG

Agriculture & Natural Resources: Grayson County is home to a wide array of agriculture. The Grayson County ANR program collaborates with many areas to help serve clientele and their needs. Some of the main areas of focus of programming are in forages, beef production, grain production, soil health, farm management, forest and wildlife management, and youth agriculture. The ANR program utilizes specialists and resources from the University to do projects and demonstrations on a local level so that clientele get a first-hand look at new and innovative approaches.

Horticulture: Horticulture is a growing part of Grayson County, whether for commercial or home production. This includes programs and resources for vegetable and fruit gardening, nurseries, vineyard production, landscape maintenance, lawn management, Farmers' Market and the Community Garden.

Leadership Development & Volunteer Programs: The Grayson County Extension service provides a way for clientele to further their education and leadership skills through programming and service. The ANR program advises several Extension volunteer organizations that serve as an arm of the Extension Service to provide education and volunteerism in the community.

Extension Master Gardeners are trained volunteers that assist county Extension agents with educational programming. This is a national organization and Kentucky has several counties involved. Grayson County has been active since 2004 and do a variety of service projects and educational events. The Master Gardener Plant Fair, the Community Gardens at Twin Lakes Regional Medical Center, and herb gardens at the Jack Thomas House are a few of their projects. They host a kids gardening program each year and have monthly educational sessions. The Master Gardener Second Medical Center, where the second set is the second back the second

Grayson County Beekeepers Association are a group of educated beekeepers that meet monthly to listen and teach educational programs. Members of the beekeepers are active in the community doing demonstrations and presentations on the importance of bees and beekeeping techniques. They volunteer for activities with the youth and work closely with Extension Agents to help with questions and issues with bees.

Agriculture Development Council is an appointed 9 member Council representing Cooperative Extension, Soil Conservation and Farm Service Agency. This Council has the responsibility to evaluate the needs of the local agriculture/horticulture economy. The mission of the board is to invest Kentucky Ag Development funds in innovative ways to increase net farm income and affect tobacco farmers, tobacco-impacted community and agriculture across the county by stimulating markets for those products. This includes finding new ways to add value and diversity products.

FCS stands for Family and Consumer Sciences Extension. FCS Extension programs aim to improve the quality of individual and family life through education, research, and outreach.

FCS programming focus on building assets of individuals and families to address problems faced across the lifespan. Family and Consumer Sciences Extension emphasizes well-being with a focus on human development, parenting, resource management, nutrition, health and leadership development. At the community level, FCS Extension prepares individuals for community and economic development and activity.

Professionals in Family and Consumer Sciences Extension provide the tools to help individuals and families to develop resources for strengthening families and building community for an ever changing society.

Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices: Family and Consumer Sciences Extension encourages families to make proactive choices to improve health and well-being, whether choosing a healthy diet, increasing health literacy for chronic disease prevention, or participating in regular physical activity.

Nurturing Families: Family and Consumer Sciences Extension focuses on individual and family development by promoting effective communication, understanding developmental ages and stages, appreciating individual and cultural differences, developing a strong value system, making wise decisions, and encouraging a supportive environment

Embracing Life as You Age: Throughout all life stages, it is important to acknowledge and celebrate the changes that accompany aging. Family and Consumer Sciences Extension helps individuals, families, and communities manage the challenges and discover the positive aspects of life transitions and growing older.

Securing Financial Stability: In the current economy, financial stability is important. That stability rests with families securing and managing their basic human needs of food, clothing, and shelter. Increasing buying power with wise consumer decision-making, avoiding pitfalls of overextended credit, developing saving habits, and managing financial risks are topics taught by Family and Consumer Sciences Extension.

Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities: Through Family and Consumer Sciences Extension, individuals improve safety in their home and decrease their environmental footprint. Community efforts are designed to promote healthy lifestyles throughout the lifespan.

Accessing Nutritious Food: Family and Consumer Sciences Extension helps families gain access to food and to stretch food dollars; communities to decrease hunger; and local food assistance programs to educate recipients on healthy and safe food preparation methods. Family and Consumer Sciences agents are pivotal in training consumers and producers to maximize local access to farm-to-table food products.

Empowering Community Leaders: Building the capacity of volunteer leaders is critical for the sustainability of communities that support and strengthen families. Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to engaging, educating, and empowering local citizens to investigate issues, make responsible decisions, and take ownership of solutions.

Grayson County FCS PROGRAMS



EXTENSION HOMEMAKERS ORGANIZATION: The Kentucky Extension Homemakers Association (KEHA) is a volunteer organization that works to improve the quality of life for families and communities through leadership development, volunteer service, and education. Across the state, County Extension Agents for Family and Consumer Sciences work closely with KEHA members and clubs to provide educational programming and coordinate community activities. Grayson County Extension Homemakers has a current membership of 57 people. That includes 3 active clubs plus mailbox members. Dues for the organization are currently \$10.00. Two clubs are located in the Leitchfield area and one in the Short Creek area. If you are interested in joining a club please contact Natalie at the Extension Office and you will be put in contact with club presidents.

MASTER CLOTHING VOLUNTEER PROGRAM: The "Master Volunteer Concept" is an outgrowth of the Cooperative Extension Service's tradition of utilizing volunteers. Interested, dedicated individuals with some prior experience and knowledge in a specific area are selected and provided with intense, in-depth training. Upon the completion of the training there is a commitment by the volunteer to spend a specified amount of time sharing their enhanced expertise with others. Currently Grayson County has 1 Master Clothing Volunteer that provides sewing classes to both youth and adults. If you are interested in participating in these classes or becoming a Master Clothing Volunteer, please contact the Extension Office. Volunteer applications for this program take place in even years. The new class recruitment will begin in Spring of 2020.

WHAT IS 4-H?

4-H Youth Development is part of Kentucky Cooperative Extension. Extension's mission is to make a positive difference in the lives of Kentucky citizens through non-formal education for the entire family. Kentucky 4-H believes in providing positive youth development experiences for all youth to experience belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity.

4-H is a youth organization committed to building outstanding leaders with marketable skills to succeed in today's society. 4-H empowers youth to reach their full potential, working and learning in partnership with adults. The four H's represent the idea of Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. These are the values members work on through fun and engaging programs.

- Head: Managing, Thinking
- Heart: Relating, Caring
- Hands: Giving, Working
- Health: Being, Living

4-H'ers, regardless of their background, socio-economic status, race or gender, benefit from their participation in Kentucky 4-H. Positive youth development studies have affirmed that compared to other youth, young people involved in 4-H are:

- Four times more likely to contribute to their communities.
- Two times more likely to be civically active.
- Two times more likely to make healthier lifestyle choices.

• Two times more likely to participate in Science, Engineering and Computer Technology programs during out-of-school time.

• 4-H girls are two times more likely (Grade 10) and nearly three times more likely (Grade 12) to take part in science programs compared to girls in other out-of-school time activities.

Grayson County 4-H 7 CORE CONTENT AREAS



Agriculture: The Agricultural Science Program engages 4-H members in a variety of hands-on activities and experiences that cultivate an increased understanding and appreciation for agriculture. Projects and activities are offered in the areas of beef cattle, sheep, swine, goats, dairy, equine, food science, and plant and soil science.

Family & Consumer Sciences: With Family and Consumer Sciences projects, 4-H'ers learn the skills they would often learn within the family and home; how to dress to impress; cooking skills; mend or make one's own clothing; maintain a healthy lifestyle; practice wise money skills; practice etiquette and make wise lifestyle decisions.

Health: Health, the fourth "H" in 4-H Youth Development. The traditional perception of health has been food and nutrition, however research has shown how mental, emotional, physical and environmental health are just as important. It is our goal to address and provide resources for each of these components of health education.

Communications & Expressive Arts: Public speaking plays a great part in what 4-H'ers gain from participating in 4-H. Focusing on speeches and demonstrations has served many well over the years but the core curriculum actually broadens the scope of communications to include reading, listening, interpersonal communication, writing and family communications.

Leadership: Leadership is one of the core areas of focus for the Kentucky 4-H program. There are a wide variety of activities associated with leadership development in youth. The activities involved with leadership development focus on improving the quality aspects of a young leader through reflection, explanation of leadership principle, and personal experiences.

Natural Resources: The Natural Resources Program engages 4-H members in a variety of hands-on activities and experiences that foster an increased understanding and appreciation for Kentucky's natural resources. Projects and activities are offered in the areas of environmental science, entomology, forestry, geology, soils, water, and wildlife and shooting sports.

Science, Engineering, & Technology: Science, engineering, and technology (SET) is one of the core areas of focus for the Kentucky 4-H Program. Activities, projects, and clubs are available in aerospace and rocketry, biotechnology, energy, electronics, and robotics.



WHAT IS SNAP-ED?

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program – Education (SNAP-Ed) also known as Nutrition Education Program (NEP) is a federally funded grant program that supports evidence-based nutrition education and projects for people eligible for SNAP.

SNAP-Ed targets low income families. Our goal is to educate limited resource families with children and SNAP eligible individuals to change behaviors necessary to have a healthy life style, plan nutritious meals on a tight budget, improve food preparation skills, and learn safe food handling practices.

This program offers hands-on nutrition education and focuses on developing new meal plans, cooking skills, buying healthy food, adapting healthy lifestyle habits, better management of SNAP resources, and preparing food in a nutritious way.
